Dear Congressman Sessions, Congressman Pocan, Congresswoman Holmes Norton, and Congressman Hudson:

The National Down Syndrome Society (NDSS) empowers individuals with Down syndrome and their families by driving policy change, providing resources, engaging with local communities, and shifting public perceptions. We write today in strong support of the passage of the *Words Matter Act of 2025* (H.R. 3420), which would remove the terms "mentally retarded" and "mental retardation" from the U.S. Code.

The Words Matter Act aims to remove these harmful and offensive terms in favor of more modern terms such as "intellectually disabled" and "intellectual disability." While progress has been made on this front, such as the passage of the 2010 "Rosa's Law," this legislation only applied to several specific federal laws rather than to the entirety of U.S. law. Thus, numerous sections of our country's code still employ terminology that is outdated and harmful. By removing these offensive terms, our government not only continues the work of combating discriminatory speech but also reaffirms its commitment to serving and respecting all members of our community.

NDSS strives to ensure all individuals with Down syndrome are assured of their human rights and valued by a more inclusive society. Aligned with this vision, we urge Congress to act and ensure that the legal texts that serve as the foundation for our modern society are reflective of and respectful towards the people they were written to serve.
